What does dream mean?

Literal meaning of the word "dream":

(as a noun) a series of pictures or events in the mind of a sleeping person;

(as a verb) to have a dream



(as a noun) an idea, aspiration, or ambition; (as a verb) to image, to invent












A deaf disc jockey? Sounds impossible? Not if you are Robbie Wilde, who was determined to pursue his dream of driving dancers to their feet despite his hearing loss.

Deaf DJ

By Robbie Wilde as told to Kenneth Miller



Q: How did Robbie become deaf?

I was born in England with perfect hearing. In 1990, when I was five, my family moved to the United States. I started getting ear infections every three months or so. We didn't have health insurance at the time and when I got a third infection, my parents couldn't pay for the treatment. I went deaf in my right ear and was left with 50 percent hearing in my left. Over time, my remaining hearing dropped to 20 percent, where it is today. My doctors predicted that I would be completely deaf by now, so I think I'm doing pretty well.

Answer: He was born with perfect hearing in both ears, but severe ear infections that started when he was five left him deaf in his right ear and 50% deaf in his left. Over time, his remaining hearing dropped to 20 percent.



There was always music on in my house when I was little. I loved listening to Metallica, Led Zeppelin, Bob Marley, Michael Jackson. My dad was a DJ, so he played disco, folk, dance, rock, and music from other countries. For my 18th birthday, my dad asked me to deejay at the restaurant he owned. After doing that for a few weeks, I was hooked. I wanted to learn more.



I e-mailed DJ Shiftee, a well-known New York City DJ, when I was 25: "I know you like a challenge. How about teaching a deaf person to deejay?" He wrote back the next day: "Challenge accepted." He tutored me twice a week for two years, helping me develop correct technique. I practiced four hours a day. Now when I'm performing, muscle memory takes over.

Q: How did people in the clubs feel when Robbie told them he was hard of hearing?



When I started deejaying at clubs, I wouldn't tell the managers I was deaf. I would just show up, introduce myself, and start playing music. At the end of the night, someone would say, "Oh, here's the check." And I'd say, "What? Oh, I can't hear." They were always so surprised. Sometimes I would bring doctor's notes because they wouldn't believe me. It was reassurance that they were giving me jobs because I was good, not out of sympathy. Eventually people started calling me "that Deaf DJ," and the name stuck.

Answer: They were always surprised.

Q: What does he do to help himself hear the music when he deejays for a show?



5 For a show, I set up one speaker facing my left side, my good ear, and make it louder all the way up. The speakers that play the bass are on the floor behind me so I can hear some of the lower frequencies and feel the beat in my feet. And I can feel the energy of the song and the crowd goes crazy, you feel that. The song comes to life.

Answer: He places one speaker facing his good left ear, and makes it louder all the way up. The speakers that play the bass are put on the floor behind him, so he can hear some of the lower frequencies and feels the beat in his feet.



Q: What does he love about deejaying?

I use software that turns the music into lines of color on a computer screen. Red is the bass, blue is snare, green is the vocals or melody. I'm visually hearing the music. What I love about deejaying is the creativity, what you can do with amachine, two turntables, and a mixer.

Answer: He loves its creativity, and what he can do with a machine, two turntables, and a mixer.

- I play all sorts of get-togethers now, from college parties to corporate events. I also go to elementary schools for the deaf and talk to the students about motivation and believing in themselves. I'm big on talking to the parents. I tell them, "My advice to you is to let [your kids] chase their dreams. I'm a deaf DJ, so why not?"







All Grown Up and Still in Tow

- As I stood in line, waiting for my own question to be answered, I reflected on how times have changed.
- □ 3 I am as old as, if not older than, most faculty members.
- Nonetheless, I do remember what it was like to be an 18-year-old undergraduate. The first-year experience is exciting, liberating and terrifying, all combined to help us grow into adulthood. That is, if our parents don't come with us.
- The young man at the counter had some sort of registration problem. It is inevitable in the first year. The woman behind the counter clearly felt, as I did, embarrassed for this young man, who was accompanied by his no doubt well-intentioned, but misguided, father.




- ♣ T 7 I grew very angry. "Oh, grow up, go home," I wanted to shout
 at Dad from my place in the line.
- T 8 I was equally shocked as I sat in a seminar for 500 first-year teaching assistants and was told what to do when Mom and/or Dad shows up in your office complaining about the marks or assignments that you have given to their children. It is a very real issue in universities these days.



Baby-boomer parents seem to struggle with two things: saying no and letting go. The teaching assistants massed together in the theatre were advised to send unhappy parents directly to professors. I sat in disbelief, but yes, it happens.

- Mom and Dad, your children are no longer children. Rather, they are eagerly trying to be adults. So whatever are you doing in line with them at the registrar's office?
- Twenty years ago, when I first entered university, parents ▼ T 11 did not follow their children all the way there. My parents dropped me at the front door of St. Hilda's College at the University of Toronto and drove five hours back home.
- I was not ready, prepared or clearly aware about what would happen over the course of the next four years, but I muddled through. From professors and teaching assistants to registrars and student-loan officers, I learned to find my way through the perils and pleasures of university life. Naturally, I made mistakes, but then I still do.

- The incident I saw in the registrar's office was not an unusual sight. I wish it were. Rather, about six people behind me in line, I discovered another parent-child grouping. This time a son was pleading with his mother to stay put while he went to the counter and dealt with the problem himself. They were still negotiating when I left.
- 16 Too many baby-boomer parents are overly concerned with success. They just don't want to let go.




